Mason Wins 2008 Formula Mazda Challenge West Championship!

With the title chase coming down to the wire in the Formula Mazda Challenge West Series presented by Hasa Pool Products, Larry Mason did what he had to do to score maximum points.

Mason came into Rounds 9 & 10 of the FMC sitting in second place in the standings and knew it would be a critical weekend for earning points and closing the points gap for the series title. Fortunately for Mason, everything worked out great; he was quickest in every practice, qualifying and race session, but it was by no means an easy weekend. The temperature hovered in the mid 90s all weekend at 'The Fastest Road in the West' - Willow Springs International Motorsports Park.

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Mason Provides 'Physics in Auto Racing' Lesson Plan to Charter School

Ms. Malek at the Learning Foundation and Performing Arts School in Gilbert, AZ offered Mason the opportunity to come and present this subject to her class. Unfortunately, due to his travel schedule he was unable to be there in person.

However he was able to create a lesson plan that included a visit to his www.larrymason.net website where the students could watch the in-car camera footage from Infineon Raceway. By watching this video along with the lesson plan

he provided, the students learned about Newton's three laws of motion, aerodynamics, friction, and how they apply in the real world.

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another race car that had gone off just a bit earlier. As Mason slowed for the waving yellow flag and the Atlantic car, that gave Mason's closest pursuer all the advantage he needed as he blew by both Mason and the Atlantic just past the debris field and yellow flag.

Mason had to downshift and start accelerating hard again but lost about 2 seconds to the new Formula Mazda leader. Mason was up to the challenge and soon started closing in. He caught the leader in the long uphill right hand Turn 2 and saw the leader understeering through the turn. Mason closed the gap and tucked up underneath his rear wing but then Mason's car started to 'wash out' because of the lack of aerodynamic grip on the front wings. Mason knew what to expect as he had experienced that same sensation a few years back in the same corner in a Formula Atlantic car. Mason held his line and started to look for a way past going into the 2nd gear uphill left

hander Turn 3. The leader threw a big blocking maneuver and chopped down on Mason's nose. "I knew at that point I had the fastest car, but there aren't any big braking zones at Willow Springs so I'd have to stalk him hard," Mason explained. "The next lap, I held back a bit on the entrance to Turn 2 so I'd have a great shot off the exit and he threw the big block again!" However, the leader pushed too hard in the tight Turn 4 and slid to the outside and that's when Mason pounced and drove to the inside and re-took the lead. At that point Mason was able to re-establish his lead and carried it through to the checkered flag.

"I really have to thank Moses Smith Racing for having a great set-up on the car. 'Big Mo' really understands how these cars work and it was a real pleasure to race it today and to work with him and Tara Wilson. Not only was the Polar/Bell/Tri Lab/MSR race car comfortable to drive, but I was comfortable too. I was

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Round 10 started off well with Mason taking the pole position overall. He had a great start and when the others behind him started battling for second place, "That gave me just enough room to break the draft," said Mason. He continued to extend his lead and won wire-to-wire for another satisfying win and closed the gap even tighter for the championship title.

"On a personal note, I dedicate my Round 9 win in the memory of Michael Hollander who was a good friend and an incredible auto racing journalist. I dedicate my Round 10 win in the memory of Paul Newman who was a tremendous supporter of auto racing and a gentleman I shared some time with at Willow Springs a few years ago. Both of these legends in their fields will be missed."

The final two rounds of the FMC would take place October 25th and 26th at Buttonwillow Raceway Park near Bakersfield, California. Mason's two previous victories tightened the gap in the championship standings, but he still had to win both races to win the series title. His weekend started out well with a pole position for Round 11. After a hectic start that saw Mason get boxed in traffic and lose four positions, he fought back and reclaimed each position until he caught the leader.

Although it took a few laps, Mason managed to take the lead and hoped to stay there. Unfortunately, lapped traffic and a stout competitor who wouldn't give up saw Mason relegated back to second place. This battle raged on throughout the race but Mason prevailed with a hard fought victory. "I'm really happy and proud of our results," beamed Mason afterwards. "I have to thank MSR for providing me with a great car and set-up all year. Even though 'Big Mo' wasn't able to be at the track until the race on Sunday, Mike Williams and Aaron Graham filled in and provided fantastic support throughout the

In Round 12, Mason grabbed the pole again and was never passed as he went on to win the race while his competitors battled amongst themselves. It was a bit dicey on the last lap as oil was scattered on the track. Graham was on the radio to alert Mason and he was able to navigate his way around the slip-Mason Wins cont. on Page 5
